

INCOMING MAIL

It was the July 4th 2004, weekend when I received a call from David Kreckel. His brother John Kreckel (Alpha Company, 2/506) was killed on July 22, 1970. David was only 8 years old when John was killed. David just read the book "Ripcord" and wanted to call and talk to somebody from Alpha Company that was with his brother that day. So he did some searching to find the phone numbers of the men who were mentioned in the book. After I talked to him, I called the guys from Alpha Company and after a couple days of making plans, we agreed to meet David in Washington, D.C at "The Wall".

On July 21, 22 and 23 Chuck Hawkins hosted at his home, a mini reunion for Alpha Company to meet with Dave Kreckel. People who could make this short notice gathering were Frank Marshall, Lee Widjeskog, Tom Swayne, Chuck Hawkins, Tommy Webster, James Hill, Joe Hasankulizide, Jay Wetherby and David Kreckel.

Frank Marshall

Here is the letter that David wrote us after the reunion in Wash. D.C.

On July 22, 1970, I lost my brother, John Kreckel, at a place called Fire Base Ripcord in South Vietnam. I was 8 years old the day the Olive Drab Sedan pulled up before my parents home. The lone man in the car burdened with the solemn task of telling my parents they'd lost a son. That day, the day I lost both my best friend and my big brother, was burned into my memory forever more.

For years I would wonder about the circumstances of his passing, and the people he served with at Ripcord. This past spring, entirely by chance, I learned of the existence of a book written by Keith Nolan that might provide some answers.

I've never read a book with such great interest as I did Ripcord. I can't thank Keith Nolan enough for writing it. Still, some questions lingered. At the back of the book were the names of some of the men who fought at Ripcord, with last known towns / cities of residence. I did some detective work.

My efforts led me to the mother of Frank Marshall. (Frank, I've told you this in person, but your mother is one of the sweetest women I've ever spoken to over the phone). That phone call led me to Frank Marshall, which led me to Robert Faddis and Lowell Webster as well. I'd made contact with men that actually knew my brother in 'Nam. Amazing!

Frank Marshall invited me to join him and several other Ripcord Veterans at a mini-reunion at "The Wall" on July 22, 2004. I flew to D.C. on the 21st and met a Band of Brothers unlike any I'd ever known that evening at Chuck Hawkins home.

On the 22nd, we went to "The Wall". I felt that I had so

many questions, but upon meeting these men, I seemed to have so few. This perplexed me, but after thinking long and hard about it, I think I know why.

We're all a patchwork quilt of memories and experiences we have in our individual lives. Meeting the soldiers that shared the most intense of experiences with my brother, makes him feel not so far away from me now. Very close, in fact. This is what mattered. The questions were gone.

I want to offer a heartfelt, special thanks to Frank Marshall, for putting this together for me. I can't thank all of you enough. I'm more at peace now with John's death than I've ever been.

Had a long phone conversation with the guy's mother and ended up writing a Veterans Day piece for the paper.

It is great that David stepped forward. I wonder how many others would benefit from a completion experience like the one you provided him.

THEN & NOW

Tommy Counts, Delta Co. 2/506

Tommy grew up in Columbia, Tennessee about 50 miles south west of Nashville. While attending Columbia Central High School he probably didn't think too much about the army or the draft until graduation in 1968. He soon discovered that others had been thinking of him because he was drafted and shipped off to Fort Campbell Kentucky for basic training sooner than he imagined. This was followed up with Advanced Infantry Training in the "semi-tropical paradise" known as Fort Polk.

By February 1970 Counts had arrived in Vietnam and was assigned to Delta 2/506 of the 101st Airmobile Division at Camp Evans. His platoon leader was Lt. Anderson and his squad leaders were Stanley Diehl and Mark Skinner. Stanley was killed by a mortar round after exiting a helicopter that landed on Ripcord.

In the picture we see a young Tommy Counts with two of his best squad buddies. One, George Kitzmiller was from West Virginia and opened a business in Miami, Florida after returning home. John Mason is the other and hailed from Maryland. However, Counts has not been able to contact him since the war.

Delta Company and Counts walked over hills and ridges around and on Firebase Ripcord in search of enemy troops until the battle for the hill started in earnest during July. During this dangerous period Delta and Charlie Company assaulted Hill 1000. Later the two companies teamed up to relieve D 1/506 and recover the body of Captain Workman near hill 605.

Finally Delta walked in to relieve and extract the badly mauled A 2/506 on July 23, 1970. Tommy recalls meeting Frank Marshall of Alpha for the first time during that last relief assignment because Frank said something to the effect of, "I'm from Philly". That has stayed with Tommy ever since.

As a SP4 and grunt, Tommy felt fortunate to have served with the members of the Delta Raiders under the command of Captain Rollison. In his opinion Rollison was an excellent company commander and the reason many of the Delta Raiders are alive today.

Counts spent a few more months in the field following Ripcord and then was assigned his "best job in Vietnam" as the assistant to Chaplain Fox until he returned to the states in February 1971.

Since returning to the states, Tommy has been in the billiard business. For a period of time he was a tournament pool player. However, presently he lives in the Columbia, Tennessee area where he owns and operates a Shooters Sports Bar and Grill.

He married his one and only wife, Judy in the 70's and they produced three children, Lisa, Leslie and Tommy Jr. In turn their children have presented them with grandchildren Blake, James and Julie.

Tommy says there were many great guys in Delta Company and he wishes more would attend the reunions so they could discuss the many memories. Counts can usually be found at the reunions seeking other Delta Raiders and enjoying the fellowship of other Ripcord survivors.
