A Welcome Home Tribute

During the week of 13 June 2005 a welcome home tribute to Vietnam veterans was held at Branson, Missouri. Four Ripcord Association members made the effort to attend. Mike Womack (C 2/506), Pops Hedrick (E 2/506), Robert Faddis (A 2/506) and Alfred Martin (2/11A) and their wives enjoyed the event and presented a reef at the base of the traveling Vietnam Wall in memory of those who lost their lives during the battle of FSB Ripcord.

Shows were half priced for Vietnam veterans and often for their spouses and food was discounted by 20%. Before each show, Vietnam vets were asked to stand and were cheered by those in attendance.

Static displays showed the equipment we used and gave others a chance to appreciate the strength and agility we once possessed.

The welcome home included a parade that featured members of the 101st and saw Pops Hedrick carrying a flag at the head of the parade. During the last night a simulated firefight with helicopters and gunfire was presented. While those who had never participated in a live firefight enjoyed this, some of the veterans found it disturbing and too real even 35 years later.

A very moving moment occurred when a young ROTC student was singing the nation anthem. Into the song he lost his place and started to falter when someone from the audience picked up the verse and the entire audience sang the rest of the anthem. According to those present it created a very special feeling.

Overall our group felt it was a great time and worth the time spent.

INCOMING MAIL

Frank,

Thank you for adding me to the Ripcord Association. On July 18, 1970 there were two CH-47s from my flight platoon resupplying Ripcord. I was the aircraft commander of the CH-47 that didn't crash. I flew 16.5 hours that day trying to get personnel off Ripcord and establishing a new fire support base to cover Ripcord. Several days later, I also flew as a part of the final evacuation of Ripcord. I wish I had known about the Association in time to attend the reunion this summer. I hope to attend future reunions.

I would add is that on July 18, we lost a very fine young man. SGT Michael A. Walker from Scottsbluff, Nebraska, was killed in the crash of the CH-47. I don't know if everyone knows this, but halfway around the world, SGT Walker's wife gave birth to their son that same day. Everyone in A/159 ASHB has prayed for that young man who never met his father for years. If anyone has news of the son of Michael Walker, I know we would all like to know the news. In addition, I believe many of us would like the opportunity to tell the young man what an outstanding person his father was.

Martin J. Glennon, Medic for 2nd Platoon, A/2-506

In 1969, an Indiana youth made a fateful decision when he opted to withdraw from his college English course. By so doing, he was no longer a full-time student and now available to be drafted. Within weeks Martin Glennon had received his notice and was heading to Fort Leonardwood for basic training. From there he traveled to Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas to train as a combat medic. With the completion of training in January of 1970 his family gave him a tearful good by to Vietnam. Within days he was delivered to Cam Rang Bay where he discovered he had been assigned to the 101st Airmobile Division. This assignment brought to his mind disturbing visions of airborne rangers, parachute drops and behind enemy line activities. Glennon was happy to learn that the visions were not reality but he would learn that reality was just as disturbing.

Following a week of in country training to get used to the heat and humidity Martin was assigned to work with Alpha 2/506 under the command of Captain Albert Burkard and specifically with 2nd Platoon led by Lt. Gary Kelly.

His field time started out with what was to become a familiar routine. Diagnosing minor ailments seeing that all the troops took their malaria tablets, distributing aspirins and anti-biotics and treating the minor cuts and abrasions accumulated by troops walking through the mountainous jungle terrain. This changed when the platoon Kit Carson Scout hit a booby trap and suffered severe shrapnel wounds to the chest and abdomen. Despite the best efforts of Martin this young Vietnamese died enroute to Camp Evans. The next day another booby trap was encountered and two GI's were injured. These men were successfully treated and survived their wounds in the hospital.

On the 12th of March Alpha attempted to open Fire Support Base Ripcord. Three men from the first platoon were killed and others injured. The attempt to secure the firebase was called off. A few months later the battalion and Alpha went on a weeklong stand down before going to FSB O'Riley to provide security. From a medics point of view this was a period of quiet and relaxation since the

injuries were few and generally slight. During this time Martin started reading the bible regularly. He also considered re-enlisting in order to get out of the field but after some thought decided against it. By now Martin had a new LT and Captain in Widjeskog and Hawkins (was this why he sought a new assignment and comfort in the Bible?) In all, life wasn't too bad on O'Riley.

On 10 July Alpha Company was once more inserted into the jungle and on 12 July with D/ 2-501, assaulted Hill 805, which luckily was undefended. An attack that night by the NVA led to injuries in Delta and a number of enemy soldiers killed. The next day Alpha moved off the hill in search of the enemy.

It was the morning of 22 July 1970 when Medic Glennon reported to his Platoon Sergeant Johnny Brown, that he smelled NVA. Patrols around the NDP failed to turn up any sign of

activity and the Company waited for the time to move out. Martin began reading his bible for comfort. As the Second Platoon moved out Glennon soon heard shooting, explosions and cries of "Medic" from the front. Martin froze in his tracks as the shooting and explosions erupted. SP4 Tom Schultz grabbed Martin and assured him that all would be well. He gathered his composure and moved to tend the wounded. By the end of the 6-hour firefight he had tended wounds on most of the 17 platoon members present. However, Robert Journell and Tom Schultz were dead and Brown had a serious face wound. But 15 of the 17 in the field had survived. That night when not tending to wounded he continued to read his bible.

Following the evacuation of FSB Ripcord, Glennon was re-assigned to duty at the Corp hospital and eventually left country in December. The remainder of his service was spent at Fort Knox.

Martin returned to Indiana and attended school once more. He soon decided to dedicate his life to Jesus. With that he married his girl friend Lea and finished Bible College.

Today he is an insurance salesman and a lay minister with over 100 weddings performed. He and his wife live in Valparaiso, Indiana where they continue to raise their eight children and dedicate their lives to Jesus.




