FORTS MOULTRIE AND SUMTER: These Forts are key in the history of the nation and the Civil War. Plan on a visit of the pair early in the day.

In the downtown Charleston area you may want to visit the King Street Antique Mall on King Street, the Avery Research Center for African-American History and Culture on Bull Street, the Slave Mart Museum on Chalmers St., and the Aiken-Rhett House showcasing antebellum life in the South.

Anyone planning on spending time in the downtown area, which is just chock full of things to see and do, should park at one of the Visitor Center parking lots and take the affordable DASH Trolley to help you get around and locate things.

Barry D. Mishler, B - 2/506, E - 2/506

My name is Barry D. Mishler. I served in Vietnam from 1969 -1970 as an E-4 with Bravo Company 2/506. I arrived with an M.O.S. of 11-C (mortars) but was assigned as II-B (infantry).

I was on FSB Ripcord when the Chinook was shot down on the ammo dump. On that day I was going outside the wire on a detail with two other guys. Two of us provided security while the third would cut down trees to improve our fields of fire. We had just left the perimeter when we heard the 51-caliber fire on the Chinook. We watched as it crashed onto the ammo dump. Soon things started blowing up and we were outside the wire and could not get back inside. We hunkered down outside the wire and waited for a chance to get in. After a long time the explosions became fewer, things calmed down and we were able to get back inside. In my bunker fighting position laid unexploded artillery round.

Apparently due to heavy wounded in the mortar unit, the next day I was transferred to mortars. Now instead of being in my bunker on the side of the hill, I was right on top of Ripcord where the enemy mortars hit regularly. I

didn't think we would ever get off Ripcord alive. When we were extracted a few days later, I got on the bird and never looked out. There was word that the enemy was coming up the hill like ants, but I wasn't looking.

I have recently retired from the trucking company USF Holland and am now working as a custodian for a school district in Woodstock, Illinois. I have been a member of the Union Fire Department for 25 years and I am a life member of VFW Post 5040 in Woodstock, Illinois.

I have a great wife Rita, daughter Tonya and son Jason (daughter-in-law Georgette). I have four grandchildren, Jarvis, Devin, Zoe and Gage. I also have three stepsons, Darren, Tyler and Gavin (daughter-in-law Lisa).

While my experiences in the war were minor compared to others, they were not the same as my father, Dean Mishler, who served in World War II. He had the misfortune of being captured 3 times and was held as a prisoner the last time for 112 days. To me (and probably to my brothers Bob and Scott), Dad will always be a hero.

One year before Ripcord, in May 1969, the 3rd Bde was committed to APACHE SNOW and ordered to assault Dong Ap Bia in the A Shau Valley. The hill and battle became famous as Hamburger Hill. Ripcord Caribbean Cruise Q & A

I have received some e-mails about the pricing of cabins for the Ripcord Caribbean Cruise. Hopefully this will help answer some of those questions:

The inside and outside cabins are grouped together, mid ship, on the same deck so your buddies and friends will be near each other. This price is locked in, other prices can change. The more cabins we book by this coming Valentine's Day, the longer we can lock in the price and hold extra cabins so that more can join us.

I can add some of the cheapest cabins, category Q, to our group space if you would like me to do that. But the difference in price is only \$20. The Q's are the smallest cabins on the ship and are only in the bow.

People who have cruised before know these are the least desirably placed cabins. That's why they're also the least expensive.

The cheapest cabin is Category M, \$20 more than Q. Its on the same deck as category G (outside) so that everyone can be together and be mid-ship.

The internet shows the cabin prices with the port tax added but DOES NOT add the government taxes of \$48.91.

So the internet shows the least expensive cabin, Q, as \$449 and our category M as \$469.

The only way anyone gets to see the real price, with the government taxes included, is if they go through the process of booking it online. The government tax is added in at the last step.

Money Saving Idea:

Putting \$10 a week away per person pays for the Inside Stateroom, \$17 a week per person pays for Balcony Stateroom.

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
