Ripcord Reunion 40 years later!

In early October 2010, survivors of the Battle for Fire Support Base Ripcord, got together in Fort Worth Texas to see how everyone was faring after 40 years. A total of 168 men, women and children showed up to celebrate the survival and remember the many that we lost over the 5 months operating in and around FSB Ripcord.

The hotels was great, Fort Worth was warm and friendly, the pleasant hotel staff worked very hard to make up for the short comings of the reservation staff, the hospitality room generally well stocked and there was plenty of room to visit and talk with the old and new friends that come with attending the reunions.

Many of the attendees were able to get downtown to see the demonstration put on in the streets with local cowboys and the long-horned steers that were once the main stay of Texas cattle production. Others went to the museum which houses a variety of significant art work from through out the world. And of course, all spent much time in the hospitality room meeting long forgotten buddies and seeing how recent friends had fared over the past year.

As an added bonus this year, Col Buessler generously provided a commemorative coffee mug with each registration. There was also a CD of the great work Robin Graham put together to allow us all a chance to solidify or enhance our memories of the battle and where we were on a given day. A printed copy of the CD was available for the attendees to read and peruse as they tried to see what happened on a certain date in the Ripcord battle.

One of the Kingsmen (Gerry Morgan) was able to persuade Bobby Hawk of Argyle, TX to fly in his own personal UH-1 helicopter. It was landed in the parking lot outside the hotel. The sight, sound, and nearness of this machine that meant so much to all the troops in the 101st, still sent chills up spines and dredged up deep feelings of anticipation as the appearance and thump, thump, thump of the Huey did when you were in the field. Suddenly we were all 20 years old again and nervously ready to fly into a jungle LZ. Thoughts and feelings come pouring out of the depths of our minds with the sound, sights and nearness of the UH-1. You're brain is saying "Stay low !" "Keep away from the tail rotor!" "Get in quick!" "Get off fast and get away from the chopper!" Luckily, it was not necessary to move fast or jump into the plane, because the floor of the chopper presently looks a lot higher than it did 40 years

ago. Who would have thought that metal could expand and grow that much without breaking !!! I am not certain how we managed to jump up onto the floors carrying our weapons and 60 to 90 pound rucksacks. (Oh! To be young, agile, light and in great shape once more!).

While the days were busy site visiting, the evenings were well used at the hospitality room and going out to eat. Thursday night Fred Gilbert and friends hustled out to a steak and rib place and met a couple of police officers. He told them what we were doing and invited them down. Before long we had three or four officers chatting with the Ripcord guys learning about the war. It was a great time for all.

On Friday night hot food was served in the hospitality room and the annual Ladies Raffle held. Items were donated by the men and women of Ripcord and raffled off by placing tickets in a cup. This year \$2,400 was raised and used to offset the cost of the hospitality room. Following the raffles a group headed out to "Billy Bobs" for steak and ribs. It seems they even made it back before dawn!

Saturday night found everyone attending the annual banquet. This year we were treated to a buffet Texas Bar-B-Que style. From the corn bread to the ribs, chicken and brisket it was a delicious meal.

Perhaps, since it was the 40th Anniversary, we had a lot of first time people attend. This year we were able to give Ripcord coins to 24 men as well as Jan Kalsu, the wife of Bob Kalsu who died on Ripcord and Ulla Nolan, mother of author Keith Nolan who's writing about the battle has helped to bring us together once more.

First timers were Bob Worrell B 2/501, Bill Best HHC 2/501, Roger Black and Jim McCoy both of D1/506, Fred Connor HHC 2/506, Bruce Brady, Bill Heath, Bill Helvey, Bill Rose and David Yonts all from A 2/506, Raulend Whiteis B 2/506, Dale Cooper, John Kuenen, Bob Leibecke and Bob Tarbuck all from C 2/506, Dave Bridges 426th S&S Bn., Gerry Morgan B 101st AHB, Bill Ianniello, Kirby Schaffer, and Don Stamps of the 159th AHCB, Jim Joyce and Benny Mulkey of the Pathfinders, Gene Marshall B 2/319 FA, and John Reilly 2/11 FA, Each man is a brother to us and was welcomed by the group. We are thrilled to have them attend the re-union and hope they can attend again in the future.

Thought you may enjoy my recollection of our July insertion on hill 902:

We were at Camp Evans on stand down (we were the ready reaction battalion for the division) when we were told we would be relieving a company that had been in contact for several days and had lost their company commander (found out when reading the Ripcord book that it was Hill 902); most of the details weren't passed on to the rank and file, probably better that we didn't know. We took heavy artillery & mortar fire as we were lifted in, the 506th guys were scrambling to get on the birds and off that hill as fast as possible while at the same time our pilot hovered above the LZ.

I decided it wasn't in my best interest to be hovering above a hot LZ; I leaped from the Huey while forgetting about the 80 lbs of rucksack on my back. The short jump closely resembled a front 1/2 flip which landed me on my back, lost most of my C rations, cut my arm, I crawled into the nearest hole, I then had an opportunity to look around me to see the total devastation. Needless to say, we soon found out this was not a very good place to spend a summer day.

Once again you are doing a great job with the Ripcord website.

I am trying to find out if anyone in the association was in Co. D, 2/506th on July 21, 1970. Co. D was sent in to help a company from the 501st I believe. I along with Marc Skinner was on the first two helicopters to come in on the hot lz. a bunker was knocked out and a 51. cal machinegun was captured. I was point and a guy named "snake" was my slack man when we moved off the lz. unfortunately snake stepped on a mine or booby trap and lost his right leg below the knee. I took a lot of the shrapnel in my backpack and a piece got me in the buttocks. A guy that carried the m60 was hit in his hairline also. We finally reached the company where Cpt. Rollison called in an airstrike to take out a mortar position within a few hundred yards. If there is anyone out there who remembers this

event please contact me.

I was a pointman, with the Geronimo's, C- Co- 2/501st, 101st Airborne Division Airmobile, during the battles of Operation Texas Star, Firebase's, Gladiator, Granite, & Ripcord, and saw the build up of the NVA before & after the withdrawal & return. The surrounding hills 902-Re-up Hill, Hill 805, trails etc,.... See attachment; I was there & survivor. What has been lost in translation of what happened during those battles. We were attached with 2/506, and remember LTC. Lucas, working out every day on Ripcord. I pretty much blocked out, what happened during those battles, after returning home August 8, 1970, tour completed. But, in the last 3 years its all coming back as if it was 40 years ago. I am proactive in my experiences in battle, and remind our grunts what we faced, having walked that path, and advice those grunts who are in harms way as I write. Those who we lost during those battles will always remain on the wall. We returned after your withdrawal, of Ripcord to Hill 902. I volunteered along with another grunt on a forward observation post, we would take 4 hour watches. When we finally left, I was on the last bird out. I salute your site and all those who are still with us & welcome home.

Thanks for the recent Ripcord newsletter!

On the 22d of July my wife and I went up to the Johnson County Iowa Vietnam Veterans Memorial to place Virgil Bixby's cross, wreath and flag at the stone for the day. We do this 9 times a year on the dates of the loss of our Johnson County Vietnam Vets. I could not help but think of all you men from the 101st that took part in Ripcord, that any of you survived that ordeal is a miracle.

My wife bless her heart had purchased me a copy of Keith Nolan's Ripcord Screaming Eagles Under Siege in early July, once I started reading it I could not put it down. What all of you went through those four months in that AO was put into true perspective as I read the book. Prior to our dedication of the memorial I had the honor of speaking to you about Virgil and about the 22d of July in particular, you shared a great deal with me that morning and for that I am most appreciative, the book brought it all together for me. It is hard for me to put into words my emotions about what went on there and about how I feel for all of you.

Just know that like thousands of others I CARE about each and every one of our Vietnam Vets. Having served with the 101st tho I will always have a special place in my heart for all of the Ripcord Veterans.

In Keith's book he writes about a SSG Ronlad L. Henn from Co. C 326th Engrs. and how he worked tirelessly to remove 105 shells (page 363) that were strewn about when a CH-47 was shot down during a resupply. Ron Henn was my 1SG when I arrived at Co D 326th Engrs. in May of 75. He retired in Dec of 75 and taught elementary school at Campbell for 20 years, retired and is now a Methodist minister in the Hopkinsville, Ky area. My wife and I see him every couple years and hear from him each Christmas. He was a good 1SG and I think that for the most part he spent all his time with the 101st, airborne all the way.

Enough of my ramblings. may God continue to bless you Frank as I know he did forty years ago when he brought you and the rest of those men back from that hill.
