The son of Bruce Brady A/2-506, Chris Brady is a journalist in PA and has done an excellent story on Ripcord that went into a lot of newspapers thruout the country on Veterans Day being picked up by the Associated Press. The Standard Journal of Milton, PA www.standard-journal.com also runs a 16 page magazine insert that featured Ripcord as the main story, "Out of the Shadows".

Progress Report Ripcord Oral History Interviews Grand Valley State University Veterans History Project

Our trip to Myrtle Beach in October was our third visit to the Ripcord Reunion, and our busiest yet. This time around, we had a large number of volunteers sign up in advance, which helped with our scheduling and enabled us to work more efficiently. The early signups also made it clear that we needed to run two cameras rather than just one, so I set up co-interviewer Mike McGregor in his own suite to use as a second studio. I also invited my wife, Dr. Janet Coryell of Western Michigan University, a specialist in American women's history, to come along and interview Carol Gilbert. That experiment went very well, so we are now expanding our call for volunteers to include wives of the veterans. especially those who already knew or were married to their husbands before they left for Vietnam. You see a lot of coverage of the home front for World War II, but very little for Vietnam, outside of antiwar protests, so we want to restore some balance and add the wives' side of the story where we can.

We will put out a new call for signups for interviews at the reunion this spring/summer. In the meantime, I am also interested in interviewing any Ripcord vets who live within a few hours' drive of Grand Rapids, Michigan, my home base. I make house calls, so I can do those interviews any time during the year on days when I am not in the classroom. Anyone interested in being interviewed, either at the reunion or elsewhere, can contact me by email at smitherj@gvsu.edu, or by phone at 616-331-3422.

You can access most of the earlier interviews that we have done by using the links on the Ripcord Association website. There are two names on that list, Steve Avgerinos and George Murphy, that do not have live links as of this date, but both interviews are posted in our Veterans History Archive at GVSU, which you can access by going to our website, www.gvsu.edu/vethistory, and clicking on the archive link. Two more interviews done locally over the past year, with Tim Newman and Terry Handley, will be up soon, and we are now starting to process the interviews conducted this year.

As always, everyone involved in this production cannot thank all of you enough for your continued interest and support of this documentary. It was almost exactly two years ago that we began the journey of telling the story of Firebase Ripcord through this film and it has been an incredible experience for everyone involved. Many of those involved in the production started this project while students at Temple University in Philadelphia, PA and have since graduated and watched this project change and evolve dramatically just as our own personal lives have.


The process of bringing this 80 minute documentary to life has been a great learning experience for all of us as young filmmakers and we are very proud of the product that we currently have. As stated before, the creation of this film would not have been possible without the continued help and assistance of Frank Marshall and everyone at the Ripcord Association. All members of the crew have worked tirelessly for the past two years and spent thousands of hours to tell this story correctly and respectfully, and we were thrilled to have been able to screen the film at the National Constitution Center last April. It was a wonderful event and we received a lot of helpful feedback from many of the veterans that were in attendance and have since made several changes and improvements to the documentary.

Our latest screening of the film took place last month at the Ripcord Reunion in Myrtle Beach, SC. We were even more excited to show a better version of the film to an even larger audience of Ripcord veterans and their families. And as expected we received a great collection of reactions and feedback and have since begun making the final changes and improvements before we officially complete the film and seek professional distribution.

We have received some concerns though about the status of the production as a whole from those who have not gotten a chance yet to view the documentary. A lot has taken place over the past two years and everyone's lives are very busy so I wanted to take a moment to explain some of the responsibilities and duties that have been fulfilled by our incredible team of artists and storytellers to bring this film together.

To be honest, this is just a small glimpse into the unbelievable amount of the work that has been done over the past two years and it has all been done by a just a handful of young filmmakers, most of whom have been working on a "volunteer" basis.

Your incredible generosity at the start of the production with donating on *Kickstarter* was amazing, and we were able to raise a little over \$7,000, which we again cannot thank you enough for. To be direct

as possible though, for a production of this size and professionalism, that figure is actually a very humble one. Typically a documentary like this would have a budget that exceeds \$100,000 and it would take about 3-5 years to make. To uncover all of this hidden history and create a documentary and narrative that is both compelling and concise is an extraordinarily complicated task that would overwhelm even filmmakers with several decades of experience. Most producers would not have proceeded into a project such as this with a budget like the one we had, but since we were students and still learning we sort've dove right in without asking questions and have learned throughout this process over the past two years the most wise and efficient ways to make a feature-length documentary.

We have now reached a point where essentially the documentary is "complete" and we are just making some final small editing changes to make the dramatic story more interesting and all the historical facts correct. However, after consulting with several Ripcord veterans and members of the filmmaking team we have all acknowledged that there are still some technical aspects of the documentary that we would like to improve before seeking professional distribution (DVD's, TV, etc.), those include the soundtrack of the film and several graphic design elements.

The audio design of this film is a complex one, which includes: audio from many interviews, several different tracks of music, sound effects, and several different kinds of voice-overs and narration. There are also several maps and animations that we have and are currently developing to include in the documentary to help explain the specific actions of the battle and the overall geography of the Ripcord AO. Both the audio tracks and graphics that are currently in the film are good but both veterans and members of our team have agreed that we would like to find professional assistance to "improve" these things before we release the film to the public.

However, by this stage of the production we have essentially exhausted all of our resources and are in a situation where the documentary is forced to go on a short hiatus. After overcoming hundreds of obstacles over the past two years we are in need of reorganizing the over-all production and our own personal lives so that when we start again fresh, with new resources, we are able to complete the final tasks. If we do this then the final product will be far superior than what we now currently have, and have a much stronger chance in obtaining distribution through PBS, The History Channel, or other outlets.

Again, after speaking with Frank Marshall and the Ripcord Association it seems like everyone is on the same page and agree this is the wisest choice for the documentary moving forward. We wanted to personally update all of you regarding this and thank you for your patience. We will be sending out more updates through email and also on our Facebook page:

The October 2013 Fire Support Base Ripcord Survivors and Friends reunion was held in Myrtle Beach and it had the largest number of veterans we have ever had sign and show up!!! Our final numbers were over 230 attendees with 30 coins presented to new attendees.

The weather was not as warm as many desired but the camaraderie made up for what the weather lacked. But the beach was right there and if that wasn't good enough, many made it to the local shops and entertainment venues to have an overall good time!

Since we were showing the documentary "The Ghosts of Ripcord "at noon, we held the business meeting at 1100 hours. Our finances continue to be in good shape as it is once more greater than it was a year ago. Due to Frank Marshall's efforts, the year book is now being printed privately by Frank for the cost of the ink and paper. As for us in Delta it was good seeing all the new faces and next year we hope to see a lot more new faces, and I am sure that the other Company's feel the same also. As you know when ever we find someone new we tell them about the Ripcord Association and the good work that you do for keeping the site in tack.

Most all they guys that we get hold of never heard of

the Association and many say that they wondered what had happened to their brothers from Vietnam. I have compiled a list of all the men with their addresses, e-mails, and phone numbers that we get and then add their names to the list and send them out to everyone, asking all to write or call welcoming them into the group. It is getting harder cause some have moved to different states from the addresses I have back in 1970.

The two Smith's Larry, and Donny, they were the toughest. Doug Puffer, Red Forsman, Rex Flansburg, and a few others have been trying to get hold of these guys for two and a half years. Finally I lucked out on Larry by calling the first number on my list that day. I talked to this one Larry for 20 minutes before he told me that he was in the Air Force in Korea. He told me good luck and so I went to the second number with no answer and left a message. Four hours later I get a call and when I picked up the phone and he talked I said "Larry we have been trying to find you for two and a half years". Donny "Doc" was just as hard. I wrote letters and called Donny's in Ga. only to get "no that's not me, but they would tell me good luck". I decided to call the High School in Guyton, and the women their kept passing me on to different people until I got this woman that works for the Board of Education. I told her who I was looking for and she said yes I know this guy, but unfortunately she thought he had passed away. I sent her a picture and she told me she would get hold of someone who graduated with him and let me know tomorrow. Tomorrow came and the subject line on her e-mail said "I was wrong" he is alive and lives here in Guyton. She forwarded my email to his daughter who is a principal in one of their schools and she in turn sent it to her dad. Just as I was reading her e-mail his name popped up and when I opened it he said "You found me". I called him, and we had another man on our list.

On the Ripcord website are a couple of pictures, one of four of us in Vietnam and the four of us at the reunion, both pictures were taken by the same man Rex Flansburg in Nam and at the reunion. Keep up the good work that you do and we will keep trying to get new faces at the reunions......Jay
