Greetings from New Jersey! It is hard to believe that four months have already passed since our reunion in October. All comments received by our Board



from attendees have been very positive relative to our experience at The Ellie Beach Resort by Hilton in Myrtle Beach. Our reunion later this year in October will again take place at the same hotel. I am confident that the hotel will continue to meet or exceed all our expectations. We are also arranging for a trip to Legends during our reunion. Our feedback on the Legends experience was also very positive. According to Frank Marshall the cast will have at least one repeat performer (Elvis) but will also have several new performers. Legends has agreed to maintain the same cost from our visit last year.

This Newsletter includes the registration form for the 2025 reunion. You can send your registration form and checks to me as usual and you will be able to make your reservations with the hotel. If you have any difficulty registering with the hotel, please let us know. You will also note that the Board has agreed to initiate an increase of \$25 for adults while the costs for children remain the same. This is the first increase in the cost of attendance since our reunions began. The reason for this increase is due to the fact that the overall costs of running the Association has increased, this includes tax filing, storage facility, insurance, website management and miscellaneous items. Secondly, the actual reunion was more costly than previous years. The reasons for that are twofold; inflation has increased cost across the board and the price to improve our hotel experience was more than in the past.

In order to continue to conduct our reunions as we are accustomed, we will have to increase our revenue stream. As discussed previously we have increased the registration fee. Secondly we encourage donations. We recognize that not everyone is in the financial position to make donations and we respect that fact. For those who can consider this, remember that we are a registered not for profit and donations to the Ripcord Association are a valid tax deduction when filing your annual income tax. Thirdly, and this is something that I have done in past years. For those of us who have a 401K and are subjected to a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), one way to reduce your tax liability would be to donate pre tax dollars in conjunction with your implementation

of the RMD. If anyone would like additional information about this, please contact me directly.

Now don't worry, we still have money to continue our reunions but I am looking down the road. Some may laugh since most of us are in our mid to late 70's but what the heck, let's think positive.

I look forward to hearing from you and to diligently working with our Board to make each future reunion even better than the last.

### **Recognize Vietnam War Veterans March 29**

March 29 is National Vietnam War Veterans Day. It marks the day in 1973 when all U.S. ground troops departed Vietnam. Only U.S. embassy personnel and support staff remained in South Vietnam until the fall of Saigon on April 30, 1975.

This day is set aside for Americans to recognize every Vietnam War Veteran to include those who are still unaccounted for.

From February 1961 to May 1975, more than 3.4 million Americans served in support of US military operations in Vietnam and Southeast Asia. More than 58,000 gave their lives and nearly 1,580 service men remain uncounted for according to the Defense POW/MIA accounting agency.

# Military-Themed COCKTAILS

Since I have a bar, many of my fellow vets ask me what is a good military themed mixed drink. So I turned to a website called veteranlife and found new takes on cocktails that capture the spirit of our services. Below are a few ...unique ideas.

## **#1. The Guard Duty**

If you have ever served in the military, at some point you have had to stand middle guard duty in the middle of the night. Whether as the firewatch during Boot Camp or mid watch on the bridge of the ship, you have stood and stared into the darkness, imagining you see things moving in the shadows, cursing your luck, and questioning your life choices. Perhaps you were on security, manning a machine gun post and desperately slapping yourself silly trying to keep alert. This cocktail, which blends an Irish coffee with a car bomb should take care of your drowsiness! Though you might still see some weird stuff afterwards. Do not worry, once your heart slows down next week, you'll be fine.

# Recipe: Main alcohol..Irish Whiskey *Ingredients...*

- 1 1/3 oz (2 parts) Irish Whiskey
- 1 oz (11/2 parts French Cream
- 1 tsp. Brown sugar
- 2 2/3 oz (4 parts) Hot Coffee
- 1x 5 Hour Energy shot
- 1x Caffeine Pill

#### Preparation...

Note: For the Army and Air Force, the drink is called "the Medic" and the spiced rum is substituted for cheap whiskey.

# Recipe: Main alcohol... Spiced Rum *Ingredients*...

- 1 1/3 oz (2 parts) Spiced Rum (pirate or sailor themed preferably).
- 2 2/3 oz (4 parts) Saline solution (or saltwater in a pinch).
- 1x Motrin
- 1x Ice pack
- 1x pair of woolen boot socks.

#### Preparation...

- 2. Add the crushed ice.
- 3. Blend on high for 5 to 10 seconds.
- 4. Pour into a hurricane or margarita glass.
- 5. Serve with a cherry.
- 6. Then immediately tell everyone within a 15 yard radius that you are a pilot.
- 7. Bonus points if you tell a story using your hands as little airplanes or slip your call sign into the conversation.


Later in the day, during a free moment, a soldier can stop at the mini-PX. The exchange conex is stocked with such items as transistor radios, stationery, and some snack items.

These mini-features were innovated to accommodate the men of the 2/506 working in the surrounding areas, who come in for brief standdowns.

Besides the mini-kitchen and the mini-PX, Ripcord has one other unique miniature feature. A soldier on standdown can adjust his weapons battle sight zero on the mini-rifle range just outside the perimeter.

The mini-rifle range is equipped with two improved silhouette targets with modified Canadian bulls to point out windage and elevation adjustment.

Those Screaming Eagles who have experienced the mini-trend all expressed hope that the fad would expand into other areas. As one trooper, put it, "Maybe they will



### C.R.E (Crayons Ready-to-Eat)

My wife and I attended a comedy show here in Coolidge, Arizona last Saturday night. The comedians were having a show to support our local VFW Post 3713 with half the proceeds going toward our general fund. It was a dinner and drinks night with lots of



laughs and a raffle with prizes. One of the jokes was about Marines and how they may not be that bright and sometimes needed help filling out paperwork, so they made them more comfortable by giving them crayons. But that created a problem because they sometimes ate them. So, the C.R.E was invented by a company out of Tulsa, Oklahoma called MilTreats. CEO/Co-Founder Frank Manteau is a seven and a half year Marine Corp veteran. Frank wanted an edible crayon and a way to tell them apart from other crayons, so he made them rectangular and without a wrapper so they won't be confused with the round non- edible crayons. Plus, they can't roll off the table. I won one of the raffles and received some items, one of which was a bag of C.R.E. They are made of white Belgian chocolate and the pouch contains 6 Crayons. The six colors are: Jarhead Red, Squid Blue, Dawg Face Green, Flyboy Yellow, Puddle Pirate Orange and Space Cadet White. I liked the taste as I began to bite off a piece of chocolate, but I am concerned that my IQ may be slipping.

### How to make a C-Ration Stove

The small cans included in the meal were ideal for making a stove. Using a "John Wayne" pierce a series of closely spaced holes around the top and bottom rims of the can. This stove was satisfactory, but did not allow enough oxygen to enter, which caused incomplete burning of the blue Trioxin heat tablet, causing fumes which irritated the eyes and respiratory track. A whole heat tab had to be used.

A better stove was created by simply using the can opener end of a "church key" (a flat metal device designed to open soft drink and beer containers with a bottle opener on one end and can opener on the other end. This was commonly used before the invention of a pull tab and screw-off bottle top) to puncture, triangular holes around the top and bottom rims of the can which resulted in a hotter fire and much less fumes. With this type of stove, only half a Trioxin tablet was needed to heat the meal and then the other half could be used to heat water for coffee or cocoa. A small chunk of C-4 explosive could also be substituted for the Trioxin tablet for faster heating. It would burn hotter and was much better for heating water.

A stove was usually carried in the backpack or cargo pocket and used repeatedly until the metal began to fail.
